CELEBRATE LAKE SUPERIOR DAY JULY 15

Lake Superior Day is always the third Sunday in July; it was started in the early 1990s by a group of Thunder Bay residents who sought to celebrate the body of water that dominates and defines our region. Other organizations and communities followed with festivities of their own, some of which span the entire weekend, and created Lake Superior Day(s) – which might be appropriate for such a large Lake. Watch local media for events to celebrate this wonderful asset in our back yard!

Did you know Lake Superior is the largest of the Great Lakes of North America? The lake is shared by the Canadian province of Ontario to the north, the U.S. state of Minnesota to the west, and Wisconsin and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan to the south.

Area: 31,700 mi²

<u>Catchment area</u>: 49,300 mi² (the area from which rainfall flows into a river, lake, or reservoir)

Max. depth: 1,333 ft (406 m)

Fish: Burbot, Coregonus hoyi, Trout, Northern pike,

Walleye and more



DID YOU KNOW?

Julia Ward Howe was an American poet and author, best known for writing The Battle Hymn of the Republic.'She was also an advocate for abolitionism and was a social activist, particularly for women's suffrage. In 1870 she wrote a proclamation that became the

foundation of Mother's Day: Arise then, all women who have hearts! Whether your baptism be of water or of tears! Say firmly: "We will not have questions answered by irrelevant agencies. Our husbands will not come to us, reeking with carnage, for caresses and applause. Our sons

shall not be taken from us to unlearn all that we have been able to teach them of charity, mercy and patience. We, the women of one country, will be too tender of those of another country to allow our sons to be trained to injure theirs." From the bosom of a devastated Earth a voice goes up with our own. It says: "Disarm! Disarm! The sword of murder is not the balance of justice." Blood does not wipe out dishonor, nor violence indicate possession.

As men have often forsaken the plough and the anvil at the summons of war, let women now leave all that may be left of home for a great and earnest day of counsel. Let them meet first as women, to bewail and commemorate the dead. Let them solemnly take counsel with each other as to the means whereby the great human family can live in peace...each bearing after his own time the sacred impress, not of Caesar, but of God. In the name of womanhood and humanity, I earnestly ask that a general congress of women, without limit of nationality, may be appointed and held at someplace deemed most convenient and at the earliest period consistent with its objects: to promote the alliance of the different nationalities, the amicable settlement of international question, and the great and general interests of peace.

HEALTH NOTE: BREAST CANCER

As we all know, mammograms along with breast exams are the first line of defense to detect breast cancer However, there are new guidelines that recommend that we work with health care professionals to identify if we are at a higher risk for breast cancer and need to consider other tests such as ultrasound or MRI. The first step is a simple to fill out risk tool at

https://www.cancer.gov/bcrisktool. I did it, and it is easy to apply. It calculates risk, and if that number is over 15% we are asked to contact our doctor for further options. Contact your doctor if you would like to access but do not have a computer.
